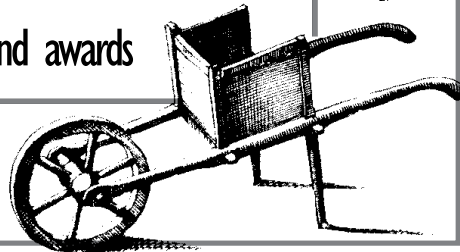
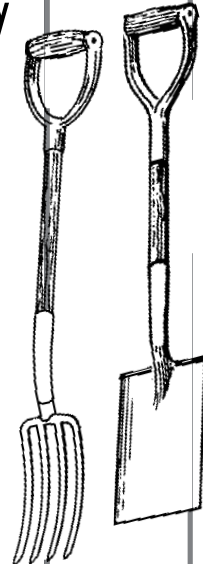
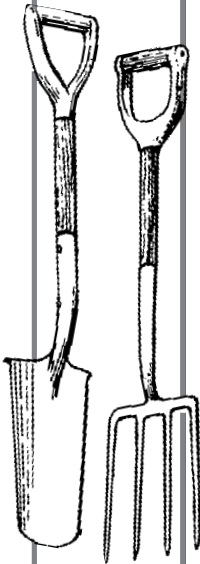

## RULES

**Please will Whichford and Ascott residents make their entries on Saturday.** They can then walk straight into the church on Monday morning to place their exhibits and avoid the queues caused by children's entries and late entries from outside the village. Thank you for your cooperation.

1. Adult entries to be made at Whichford Reading Room, adjacent to the Church, on Saturday 28th August between 9.30 and 12.30am. Late entries will be accepted definitely no later than between 8.30 and 9.30am at the Church on the day of the show.  
PLEASE NOTE THAT NO ENTRIES WILL BE TAKEN ON FRIDAY THIS YEAR!
2. Childrens entries are made on Monday 30th August between 8.30 and 10.30am.
3. Exhibits to be arranged between 8.30 am and 10.30 am on Monday 30th August, in Whichford Reading Room and in Whichford Church.
4. All exhibits to be shown on Exhibitors' own plates, dishes, containers, etc, at their own risk. The Society will not be responsible for any loss or damage to display equipment or exhibits.
5. Exhibits must be the Exhibitors' own work and, in the case of vegetables, fruit, flowers, etc., of his or her own allotment and/or garden. Any competitor violating this rule will be disqualified and will forfeit entrance fees.
6. The Society reserves the right to inspect Exhibitors' gardens or allotments at any time prior to the show.
7. The decision of the Judges and Show Committee shall be final and binding on all matters relating to the show. Any award may be withheld or modified if, in the opinion of the Show Committee, the number or quality of exhibits is considered undeserving.
8. Any complaints arising from these rules must be in writing and handed to a Flower Show Organiser before 4pm on the day of the show. Each complaint must be accompanied by a fee of £1 which, in the event of the complaint being upheld, will be refunded. The Show Committee's decision shall be final.
9. Judging in all Divisions will be between 11am and 1.45pm on Monday 30th August and exhibits will remain on display until 5.15pm. All exhibits MUST be removed between 5.15pm and 6pm. Any exhibit left after 6pm may be discarded.
10. Exhibitors may enter not more than three exhibits in a class; each exhibit will constitute a separate entry; no exhibitor will be eligible to take more than one prize in a class.
11. Entries must be made in the name of one person only.
